What Does Wallahu Yasimuka Minannas Mean?

The Historical Context and Tafseer

According to classical Tafseer, this verse was revealed when the Prophet ﷺ was facing severe assassination threats. Upon its revelation, he dismissed his human bodyguards, placing absolute reliance on Allah's promise of protection until his prophetic mission was complete.

Imam Ibn Kathir records a famous narration detailing the Prophet's ﷺ trust. While resting under a tree during an expedition, a hostile Bedouin named Ghawrath ibn Al-Harith managed to sneak up, draw the Prophet's sword, and asked, "Who will protect you from me now?"

The Prophet ﷺ calmly replied, "Allah." The sword immediately fell from the man's hand.

This is the essence of *Wallahu yasimuka minannas*. It wasn't just a metaphor; it was an active reality. Imam Nawawi emphasizes that this protection wasn't just physical; it was a safeguarding of the heart from the fear of creation.
